THE LIVERPOOL BANK FRAUDS. – Mr. Justice Bigham on Saturday passed sentence on the four defendants who were before him charged with the fraud and conspiracy in connection with the Liverpool Bank frauds. Thomas Peterson Goudie and Richard Burge were each ordered ten years' imprisonment. The prisoners William Stiles and Thomas Kelly were each sentenced to two years' imprisonment. ....

**THE BANK SWINDLER'S DEATH.**

**Goudie's Treatment in Gaol.**

The death of Thomas Peterson Goudie was the subject of an inquest yesterday in Parkhurst Prison, where he was serving sentence of ten years' penal servitude, passed in 1902, for extensive frauds on the Bank of Liverpool while serving as a clerk in the bank. It was stated that as a prisoner Goudie had been employed in printing, tailoring, and agricultural work. He had had no punishment diet during the whole of his imprisonment. He had been in hospital ten times at Parkhurst, suffering from an affection of the eyes and also from gastric ulcer, which in the end weakened the arteries. Dr Cunyngham Brown stated that the convict had lately been fed artificially several times. A friend of the family, who was present, said Goudie had expressed satisfaction with his treatment in prison. The verdict was death from natural causes.
