Death of Mr. A. H. Rowland. – The death occurred at New Barnet on Saturday, at the age of 77, of Mr. Arthur Henry Rowland, who was well known in the borough as being associated with his son (Capt. A.H. Rowland) in the business in Nodehill carried on under the name of the late Mr. R. C. Gray, from whom they purchased it in 1933, and as a popular member of the bowling club. Mr. Rowland's wife died soon after he came to Newport and he leaves three sons and two daughters. For over 40 years he was country manager in the Eastern counties for the London firm of Truman, Hanbury, and Buxton, brewers, and while residing at Barnet and Frinton-on-Sea he was a very prominent worker and speaker for the Conservative Party, being for some years vice-chairman of the St. Albans Conservative Association. He was a freeman of the City of London, a Past Master of the Friendship Lodge of Freemasons, No. 206 (London), and a member of the Turners' Livery Company. Mr. Rowland had written many poems, a good selection of which was published in 1902 under the title of "Songs of peace and war," he was a great lover of music, and took a deep interest in the Y.M.C.A. The funeral was on Thursday. A service in Holy Trinity Church, New Barnet, conducted by the Rev. A. D. Stewart (vicar), preceded the cremation at Golders Green.
