THE FUNERAL—of Mr. F. Gustar, of Ash-road, took place on Tuesday, the first part of the service being held at the Unitarian Church, the Rev. W. Clark-Lewis officiating; the interment was at Barton Cemetery. The mourners were the deceased's sons, Messrs. William, Frederick, Albert, Arthur, Charles, and Frank Gustar, Messrs. J. Gustar and E. Gustar (nephews), Messrs. F. and G. Freemantle, S. C. Wadham, T.C. (ex-mayor), A. E. Wadham, P. F. Wadham, Stanley Wadham, and Victor Wadham, and deceased's fellow employees at Messrs. Wadhams', whose firm deceased had faithfully served for some 53 years. The numerous floral tributes were sent by Messrs. Wadham, the employees of Messrs. Wadham, the Robin Hood Slate Club, and the ladies at Broadlands House. Messrs. Gustar, Scott, and Nobbs carried out the arrangements. The Rev. Clark-Lewis, at the church, where there was a large number present, said that a man who spent more than half a century in one situation must have been "a workman that needeth not be ashamed," one whose work gave him interest and pleasure. Conscience and pleasure in work were altogether too rare qualities to-day. If we realised the greatness of life we should know it was not something to shuffle through, but a Divine charge for which we must give an account. The man who did his part in such a temper and spirit was ever missed in any niche that he had filled—Mrs. Gustar and family return heartfelt thanks for many kind expressions of sympathy in their great bereavement and for flowers sent.

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
