NEWPORT WOMAN FOUND DEAD BY POLICE

SOLICITORS SEEK NEXT OF KIN

Miss Lilian Ethel Mytton, aged 69, was found dead in bed at her home, 131 St. James's Street, Newport, when police forced an entry into the house on Tuesday. Miss Mytton, who lived alone, had not been seen for several days. In the opinion of Dr. R. H. Sandiford, she had been dead 24 to 36 hours. The Coroner (Mr. J. V. Bullin) was informed, but decided not to hold an inquest, death being due to natural causes.

Mrs. Attrill, of Drooping Ash, Crocker Street, a close friend of Miss Mytton, had not been able to visit the house recently because of illness. She called on Tuesday, and, seeing milk and newspapers on the doorstep, became alarmed and told her husband. Mr. Attrill reported the matter to the police. P.S. McMahon and P.C. Lewis entered Miss Mytton's house from the rear.

Messrs. Gunner, Wilson and Jerome, solicitors, of Newport, who have acted for the family for many years, are anxious to hear from the next of kin. She had no close relatives; her parents are dead, and a brother died unmarried. Miss Mytton had lived alone since 1944.
